It was an early energy drink that farmers used while working in the fields cutting hay. In those days haying was all done by hand with a scythe and pitch forks and was grueling work.

2 quarts cold spring water 1 1/2 cups cider vinegar 1 cup molasses 1/2 cup brown sugar 1 teaspoon ginger

The above amounts can be varied to taste. Maple syrup was many times substituted for the sugar. Try it - it's great!

# JUNE 15-18—LINCOLN, NE 5th ANNUAL INTERNATIONAL SPEEDSTERS TRIALS & REUNION by Mel Poppe

The reunion is a bi-annual meeting celebrating cars powered by pre-'35 side-valve Ford four-cylinder engines. It was held at the Smith Collection Museum of American Speed in Lincoln, Nebraska. These speedsters were the earliest racecars, simple and affordable, one and two seat machines that were easily built using Model T and Model A engines.

Approximately thirty Speedsters, Model As and Model Ts from across the U.S. traveled 135 miles on rural paved roads from Lincoln to SAC Museum near Omaha. Members of the Nebraskaland Model T and Antique Car Club, helped as turn marshalls for the tour. During a light rain in the morning, we tried to make sure no one missed their turn. After our tour through the Strategic Air Command Museum, we ate lunch at Round the Bend Steakhouse. In the afternoon it was a beautiful sunny drive back to Lincoln.

We toured Bill Smith's Speedway Motors Museum which is home to Kirk Wright's famous Model T. According to Joe Fellin, Kirk was a member of the Sun Country Club, and most of his T collection went to the Speedster Museum. We saw his "skinnin' wagon" that looked old and decrepid, but was very advanced mechanically. Joe said Kirk had a ticket once for going 100 mph on the freeway.

I helped fellow T club members inspect each car that was going to participate in the old fashioned hill climb the next day.

An exciting part of the event was our own club's speedster, that was built from scratch in a shop class at Lincoln Northeast High School under the guidance of the Nebraska Club members, participated in the tour. You may remember the four Nebraska guys who attended the National Meeting in Mesa in 2008 which EVMTFC hosted, and won the Youth Program Award for this project.

It was an interesting event and we had fun helping. Watch your Vintage Ford magazine for more photos and articles. If you get a chance to come to Nebraska, be sure to check out the Speedway Museum. Maybe we will see you next summer at the MTFCA National Tour in Lincoln, which the Nebraska club is hosting.

#### A MAN & HIS MODEL T

It all started when I was about 4 or 5 years old. My dad had a 1930 Model A. I loved to ride in it. My dad would come home from work at noon every day and my brothers and I would watch for him. He would stop at the end of the driveway to get the mail. When he jumped out to get the mail, we had to time it just right and be in the car when he came back and he would give us a ride to the house. It was almost a block but it was a ride. Since that time, when I would see a Model A or T, it would be a reminder. I told myself, "Mel someday you are going to have one of those."

Over the years I kept watching for the right one to come along at the right price. A friend of mine discovered this 1926 T Touring and it was for sale. I had just built myself a shop and was ready for it; problem was my shop was just a

shell of a building with dirt floors, no electricity and nothing much for equipment other than hand tools.

As I accumulated more equipment and put electricity and a cement floor in the shop, I began the disassembly and sandblasted the parts. The bottom 4-6 inches of the body was rusted out and had to be replaced. I didn't know much about body work so I went to night classes to learn how to weld body metal and reshape. It turned out very helpful to be able to use the school's metal brake and shears.

Here it is at last, after 13 years of taking it down to the frame and putting it back together again and completely overhauling the engine, transmission and differential. I took it out of the shop on June 27, washed the dust off that had been accumulating and took it on its maiden voyage of about 15 miles. It ran good and made it back on its own power. Top speed of about 38 mile an hour




















