

John Peterson, the brain behind the overall design, had the honor of pulling the chuck wagon on it's first official shakedown event. He said it pulled with his very original condition car with relative ease, sapping only a small amount of power on the hills.

Within minutes of arriving at the group campground, after the obligatory photoop, the Chuck Wagon was set-up for its weekend of service. With the set-up completed, we were treated to a private cactus blossom interpretive walk guided

#### FROM MESA TO RICHMOND

My first performance was a test run to Usery park in May to cater to my builders and friends. With no opening jitters I came up with "three squares" for them. This opening tour was at the hitch of Lizzie Jane, Jan & John Petersons 'Tudor'. Old Liz must have been as excited as I was as she provided four consecutive 'free starts' during our hitch. This trip of under forty miles did little to prepare me for 4000 miles and a fling on the world stage.

Admittedly I was not under tow by one of these wonderful Model T's for this trip. I shared the close--very close-confines of Dave Veres's trailer with Jenny Fellin. It was so close that my tow bar nuzzled under Jenny's front axle (I was backed in). As close as this was, we shared an even closer "contact sport" experience in Richmond that I will leave to Jenny to explain.

The trip went smoothly with our staying a bit ahead of a weather system. Sunday, in the late morning, we rolled into our home spot for the next week, a nice place with a view of the swap meet and all the activities. By early afternoon I got out to stretch and be towed "T" style to a nice spot in the vintage camping area.

That night the excitement began.

Remember the storm system behind us-it arrived --! Wind, rain, even a bit of hail. Thankfully my guys built me strong and displayed me on high ground. Some vintage campers were damaged, and people sleeping in them got very wet. My side curtains were a bit saturated but kept my innards safe and I was on full display Monday morning for all the world to see. Yes, I mean all the world--participants were from 45 states and nine countries, plus thousands of visitors and the press. I posed for thousands of pictures--my profile, my innards, and my display time-line chart.

My command performance was on Wednesday night. It seems that Jim Martin of Sun Country had invited some friends over for a cookout at his motorhome site; turns out he had too many friends, a guest list north of forty. That was the time for Chuck E. to come to the rescue. With Austin Graton--my Chief Cook--in from New Hampshire and my grill a-blazing, we served up brats for the crowd. Since the attendees included the National President-Elect Joe and CEO (Jay & Barbara), I plan to add that I cooked for a "State Dinner" to my resume.

All too soon my week in the sun--and rain-was over, and it was time to head back to my cozy travel trailer for the long trip home. After an entire week of demonstrating my electrical prowess, I still had enough juice left to winch myself up into the trailer. I'd say that puts the Energizer bunny to shame.

After a little rest in Austin's garage, I'll be ready for an active tour season. Con on, October! Well, Chuck E. covered many of the details of the Centennial By my rough count, about two dozen people from the Valley of the Sun attended. It's hard to assign attendance to a particular club because many of us belong to more than one club. Joe and I pulled Joe's car and the club chuck wagon in Dave's enclosed trailer that he purchased from Ed. Have you got that straight? This was a once-in-a-life-time" event, and I think that is often enough. For me, "wouldn't have missed it" and "wouldn't want to do it again" come to mind. As Chuck E. described, it was a tight fit in the trailer with the various clearances at approximately tow inches. This required careful planning and good tie-downs. We did a trial load and run up to Superior in June to see if this whole idea was going to fly. outcome was that it fit, and the little Dakota six-banger would pull this 6000pound sardine can. I said the little 3.7 liter 6 engine was equal to one-and-a quarter Model T engines, and Joe referred to the Dakota as the Little Truck that Could.

The trip was quiet and uneventful until the last two hours before reaching Richmond. Then Joe's phone started to ring. He was coordinating the seminars. With four or five seminars every day this turned into a full-time job for Joe. He did not have much time to rubberneck or tour. Without my "T" I did not do much touring, either. Tours are nice, but the events at the fairgrounds were the real heart of the Centennial for me. Every

shape and form of a Model T that you can imagine, and some that you can't, was there. I do not know how people that toured every day could do the other events justice.

It is hard to get real numbers on an event like this, but I will toss out some figures; entrants from 45 states and 9 countries, Perhaps 600 cars 940 cars in all. paraded to the Hagerstown fly-in. This in about two hours resulted congestion. Joe and I carried a press person and had a police escort on the way over and a free lunch at the Ford tent while the traffic cleared on the return. Traveling with a board member does have its privileges. The banquet room was set up for 2200 and was full for the Monday-night opening dinner. By the Friday-night closing dinner people were leaving, and I would guess its attendance to be 1500.

We loaded on Saturday evening and left Richmond on Sunday morning for an indirect trip home. We spent a couple of hours in my childhood home town of Paxton, Illinois. I had not been there since 1949. People say that you can't go back to your childhood, but these small Midwest towns change so slowly that it almost seems that one could.

From there we headed north to Wisconsin to spend two nights with Joe's friends. We unloaded the "T' a few miles from his friends farm to allow him to drive up to it. Joe probably got as many tour miles in up there, transporting his many friends in this fun-loving group.

After three more days on the road, we rolled in home on day #16. Quite a trip for two 70-ish men, an 80-ish car, and a youngster of a chuck wagon, not to mention the Little Truck that Could.

On Sunday night a storm hit waking us up. Pouring rain, lightening, thunder, hail, and the wind. I have seen many storms, but that one was memorable! But, Briana slept right through it. The next morning off we went on our first of three tours.

We went to a privately owned home that I thought was amazing...it was built around a log cabin! But, you would not have believed it by the looks of the home. It was in a word, Grand! The antiques in their home were spectacular, furniture, area rugs, lamps, glassware all in amazing condition. What a treat. The morning refreshments were served on silver trays. Tea...of course on a beautiful tea service! We were treated like royalty. And the grounds...oh my, were they ever well kept. Hedges, grass, a circular driveway. How nice of them to be so hospitable. The T's were on display and enjoyed by all. Off we went on a trip through a park that is normally used for bikers and hikers.

The tree lined roads were narrow, and steep! But, what a privilege it was to be able to use the pathways that are never open to motorized vehicles. Once, we were through the park we continued to the Starr Gennett area...they made Starr Pianos and recorded jazz...to include musician Louis Armstrong! From there we drove through Glen Miller Park on to the Hayes Arboretum where we were

provided with a box lunch. Off again, to E. G. Hill Memorial Garden...the folks there were apologetic because the roses were not at their peak. But, the hundreds of plants still had numerous roses of every variety imaginable was still most impressive! Off we go! Next stop was supposed to be the Gaar House & Museum, but we started having some trouble with the T and vicious looking thunderclouds were approaching...remember that last storm I described? I was ready to head back and it had been a long day. Oh yeah, we still had an opening ceremony to attend that night. Speakers, a buffet dinner, good company, wonderful memories...But, Tuesday was going to be a quiet day...for me anyway.

Tuesday, Austin attended some seminars while the rest of us stayed behind and did a little exploring. They had competitions in what team could put a Model T together the fastest. They were put

together in minutes! Amazing. I wish we had a team here in NH to put Austin's other Model T together!!! Tyler met up with a young man who had a miniature Model T. There were several of these miniatures at the fairgrounds brought along for the younger set to enjoy! Tyler & Briana really enjoyed themselves. Quiet day for me until I happened to look at an incision that Tyler had on his arm (a miner surgery he had had in Arizona prior to coming to NH). It looked inflamed. Off to the medical tent we went. They thought he should be seen by a doctor. I don't know any doctors in

Indiana. The Deputy Sheriff made an appointment for Tyler! They were so helpful. And the Sheriff was apologizing because they could not TAKE us to the doctor! It all turned out well, antibiotic and that was that. Oh yeah, on to the Hagerstown Airfield for the vintage aircraft fly-in. There were more than 15 bi-planes & mono-planes.

Austin's favorite was the 1911 Wright-B-military flyer. In addition to the planes there were more Model T's assembled on the field that day than have ever been assembled in one place. These cars were of every year, color, condition and body style that you could imagine. Truly a sight to behold. We were there for several hours and more Model T's were arriving while others had left. So much for a quiet Tuesday. Wednesday, early rising for our next tour.

As most of you already know, Austin's family is in the business of historic restoration primarily the building & restoration of covered bridges. When we saw that one of the tour choices was about the Covered Bridges of Preble County, OH. We didn't want to miss out on this particular tour. We passed through several covered bridges including the Harshman Covered Bridge built in 1894; Roberts Covered Bridge, one of only six double-barrel bridges remaining in the U. S.; Brubaker Covered Bridge, circa 1887; Christman Covered Bridge built in 1895 to mention some of them. On this day we had our morning break at Fort St. Clair Park, a heavily wooded retreat. I would have liked to have stayed a bit longer at this

stop...it was so interesting with a lot of historical value. We also stopped at the Preble County Historical Museum Farm. The museum was home to a pristinely restored 1903 Model A Ford...not black in color but a rich red with lots of brass! So much to see, so little time. The museum includes an old of buggies, full old implements and tools. There is also a two story log home that patrons are allowed to go through. The home is over 200 years old. It is completely furnished to reflect that era. These tours were not just from point 'a' to point 'b' each was given so much thought out and planned so well. I can only say the tour committee did an outstanding job! By the way, one of the bridges that we passed through is generally closed to traffic...the committee got special permission for the T's to pass through it. So much attention was paid to detail.

The highlight of Thursday was the Parade! The objective was to set a new world record for the most cars of one marques in one parade. The previous record was 117 we broke the record alright...we had 375...we were vehicle #366. I do not believe that record will be broken any time soon. We paraded to the historic section of downtown Richmond. Along the parade route there were so many folks along the sidewalks, in their front yards, on porches and every place in between! Our route was about 5 miles long. What a parade! Back to the fairgrounds and a little rest...Barbeque this evening! Jim & Doris Martin invited EVMTFC to their barbeque at their campsite. They soon realized they

kind of invited quite a number of people. They only had a small grill to cook on...Chuck E. Wagon to the rescue. What a hit the chuck wagon made. Austin did most of the grilling and the food as usual was more than plentiful. Fun was had by all. Joe Fellin never did convince my granddaughter, Briana, that his glass was filled with grape juice! But, they did have fun teasing each other.

Friday we again headed out for what turned out to be my favorite tour! The 90 mile tour was called Canals to Lakes and Everything In-between! I remember my first reaction of not being very excited about this tour. Our first stop was Roberts Park in Connersville for our coffee and pastries. The gardens were absolutely beautiful. Tyler took a picture of one flower that was about 7 inches in diameter! In the photo one would never realize how big these flowers are. don't know the name of it but I do know that it was amazing! It was at this spot that Austin said that the generator on the Tudor was not working. Many fella's gave advice and tried to repair it...but, simply put, there was no fixing it. But filled with reassurance that the T's charge would carry throughout the day, we continued on. The next stop was Fayette County Historical Museum. This museum displays a huge assortment of Civil War relics, a 1924 Mc Farlan & a 1913 Empire auto which were both built in Connersville. The Empire is one of two known to exist & is in unrestored, original condition. The Empire is the 'pride and joy' of the Museum! On to Metamora which is a wonderful

community of small shops, lots of history and full of townsfolk who truly love their town! It is the home of an 1838 canal that features the only remaining section of the Whitewater Canal with working locks. We rode on the horse-drawn canal boat through the only 'covered bridge' aqueduct in North America. Another attraction, the still operational gristmill. This small village was filled with interesting people, filled with pride!

What a joy to see this perfect place. Time to head back...I hope to visit this quaint little town again!

Friday evening we attended the closing ceremony & dinner. Awards were presented, a video from Jay Leno who was unable to attend was played. Our party was coming to a close. The drawing was held for the painting that I donated...Joe Fellin was surprised that he won it. I would have liked to have stayed to dance to the Big Band music, but frankly, we were getting mighty tired and still had the trip back to NH ahead of us. But I did enjoy the dance with Steve Linney. Thanks again, Steve.

I can't express how much we appreciate all of the work that went into this event. They had over 1,000 volunteers who helped with the event. A tremendous amount of time, effort, planning, & coordinating was given in order to pull off the T-Party! What a good job they did!!! The entire Richmond community should also be so very proud of themselves for all of their hospitality. It seemed everyone had the attitude that

they just could not do enough for us. Hat's off to the Model T Ford Club of America for an absolutely awesome celebration. All of you made Henry very proud!

The recipe was titled: Sauce pan brownies - Fran ½ cup Butter 2 squares chocolate
Melt the above in a sauce pan

Add:

1 cup sugar

3/4 cup flour

1 teaspoon vanilla

1/4 teaspoon salt

2 Eggs beat each egg separately and add them 1 egg at a time

1/2 cup walnuts

Preheat oven to 325 degrees Line a 8x8 baking pan with waxed paper. Pour in the mixture. Bake for 25 minutes.

All is mixed right in the sauce pan that the butter and chocolate was melted in...Hence the name sauce pan brownies.



















