A MAN AND HIS T

My Model T story starts in 1926. When none of the farmers in our area had tractors, let alone trucks, my Grandfather bought a brand new 1926 TT Ford and was hauling his grain and livestock to market in



Kerkhoven, MN, approximately 10 miles from our farm. All other farmers in our area were hauling with horses and wagons. Don't you think he was the talk of the neighborhood.

The cab and box were made by a company named Viking Commercial/ Farm Bodies and Cab Company. Don't exactly know where they were located. Most likely in Minneapolis or St Paul.

Although Ford was making steel enclosed cabs for the TT by this time, my Grandfather ordered a wood cab because he thought wood was better than steel. The

box was made for hauling grain, but the boards could be spaced for hauling livestock. There also is a tie down ring on the floor for tying down livestock when you would haul them to market. There's a story of how nervous my Grandpa was when he hauled a big bull in the truck.

My mother remembers going to town with Grandpa. There was only room for two on the seat so they rode with the doors open and she sat on the floor with her feet on the running board.

My first recollection of the truck is when I was very young. I was going to town with my dad and we

met Grandpa on the road going home after selling a load of grain. He also used the truck for hauling hogs and cattle.

The truck had limited use in the later years. My Grandpa farmed until 1949 (the last license plate was 1945 that I still have). The truck was more or less put to pasture, only used on the farm to haul grain from the threshing machine to the grainery.

About 1955, my cousin, Bruce, and I got interested in the old truck standing in a shed just wasting away. So we decided to get it running.



Somebody showed us how to test coils with a battery and we discovered that only one coil buzzed. We eventually saved enough money to order the coils from Montgomery Ward. They were \$3.00 a piece. We installed the coils, bought a hot shot battery, aired up the tires, and put in gas. We were good to go, so we thought!! No such luck. We couldn't get it started. So we pulled it with my Grandpa's 1938 B John Deere and got it going.

My Grandpa's farm was ½ mile long and had a field road right down the middle. From then on our entertainment was driving the Model T as fast and hard as we could up and down the field road.

The radiator was leaking so my Grandpa's fix was to go the chicken coop and get an egg, crack it and dump it in the radiator. Grandpa said "we'll give it an egg." I can't say that this was a permanent fix!!

In 1958, I drove the truck to Sunburg for Minnesota's Bi-Centennial parade. There was a band in the truck box playing music to entertain the crowd. After that, the truck was left standing in Grandpa's shed, neglected again.

In 1966, the farm was rented out. The truck got pulled out of the barn and parked in the woods. I went to the farm with my race car trailer and rescued the truck, bringing it to my dad's farm.

When my Grandpa passed away, the truck was willed to Bruce and me and I bought his share.

In 2001, we had a T Totaler's Club work meeting at our house. After the meeting, I had a pile of parts on my shed floor which was the beginning of the restoration of my truck. Three years later, starting from the ground up, it is now on the road.

After I completed the restoration, I took it to the nursing home where my mother resides. The male residents came outside and were fascinated with the truck which gave them nostalgic memories of yesteryear. One gentlemen was 100 years old. He looked under the hood, told me all about the Warford transmission and said "I bet I could still drive this truck".



Needless to say, I was an absolute hit with the elderly ladies, looking thru the window, telling each other their fond memories.

In 2006, Laraine and I took our first 50 Mile Model T Club tour and ended up in the rear of the pack all day. We decided if we were going to be serious Model T tour enthusiasts we would have to buy a car that would keep up. Thus our 1925 Fordor.

Now our truck is mainly used for parades and an occasional joy ride around the neighborhood.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

HARVARD BEETS

Here is the recipe I use for Harvard beets. It's from Better Homes and Gardens.

1 1-pound can (2 cups) beets (or fresh cooked beets can be used)

2 tablespoons sugar

1 tablespoon cornstarch

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup vinegar (I use cider vinegar)

2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Drain beets, reserving 1/3 cup liquid. In saucepan combine sugar, cornstarch, and salt. Stir in reserved beet liquid and vinegar and butter. Cook and stir till mixture thickens. Add beets, heat through. Serves 5.

ORANGE BEETS

In saucepan combine 3 tablespoons sugar, 1-1/2 tablespoons cornstarch, and 1 teaspoon salt. Slowly stir in 1/2 cup orange juice; cook and stir till thick. Add 1 tablespoon butter and one 1-pound can sliced beets, drained. Heat through. Makes 4 servings.

HARVARD BEETS

This recipe comes from a cookbook given to me from my grandmother. The cookbook is called Woman's Home Companion and was published in 1944.

Beets, home cooked or canned, sliced or diced, 2-1/2 cups (No 2 can) Sugar, 1/3 cup Cornstarch, 2 teaspoons Vinegar, 1/4 cup Beet liquid or water, 1/4 cup Butter, 1 tablespoon

Drain beets, reserving liquid. Combine sugar and cornstarch, stir in vinegar and beet liquid or water; stir over low heat until thickened.

Add beets and butter; heat. Makes about 5 servings.


