






# Do you know who I am?

### **COOKIES-and-CREAM CAKE**

This recipe came from a recipe book called One Hundred & One Things To Do With Cake Mix.

1 white cake mix 1-1/4 cups water 1/3 cup vegetable oil 3 egg whites 1-1/2 cups Oreo cookies, crushed

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In large bowl, combine cake mix, water, oil, and egg whites until smooth; gently stir in crushed cookies. Pour batter into greased-and-floured 9x13 inch pan.

Bake 25-35 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool completely.

1 can (16 ounces) vanilla frosting 1/2 cup Oreo cookies, crushed Mix frosting ingredients and spread over cake.

# MTFCA NATIONAL TOUR – HEARTLAND OF AMERICA "T" TOUR JUNE 17-22, 2012 — LINCOLN, NEBRASKA HOST CHAPTER: NEBRASKALAND MODEL T AND ANTIQUE CAR CLUB

Reg and I were delayed in arriving in Lincoln because of a family wedding on June 16<sup>th</sup>. We arrived at the Country Suites in Lincoln (host hotel) Monday afternoon (June 18<sup>th</sup>). The hotel was a great place and the staff friendly and accommodating. We took the 1927 Model T Tudor with us in our enclosed trailer and it did start right away but only ran for about 5 minutes and quit and I thought, "Oh no, here we go again, car trouble". Reg and a friend back in Grand Forks had worked on tightening the bands before we left and Reg thought maybe they were too tight. It was so hot out that he waited for some shade to work on the T. I unpacked while he worked on the T. Why in the world did we bring so much "stuff" along, but then I reminded myself we usually go thru 2 outfits a day because of the heat during the daytime and when you get back to your room you just want a shower and change of clothes. Later that afternoon we went to the hospitality room and hardly anyone was there. We were told everyone was still out on the tour for the day and were all slowly returning. The tour for that day was to Beatrice, NE and it was 182.9 miles. We ran into Lorie Poppe in the hallway, her and Mel had just returned from the tour, and she looked so hot and tired. Both Reg & I agreed we didn't feel so bad now that we missed the tour that day.

Tuesday June 19<sup>th</sup>, after a delicious breakfast (complimentary of the hotel) we were off and running to Nebraska City. We pulled out of the parking lot at 7:30 a.m. right in morning rush hour traffic. I read the directions in the tour book while Reg maneuvered in and out of traffic. Most of the people were friendly and let us in, but others were not happy that we were slowing down their morning commute. Our main stop for today was the Arbor Lodge State Park and we toured the Arbor Lodge mansion. This was the home of J. Sterling Morton (Morton Salt). It was a beautiful mansion, even had a bowling alley in it. The mansion features Victorian and empire furnishings, many of which were owned by the Morton family. The mansion currently functions as a museum and contains many items related to the history of Nebraska. The carriage house contained early carriages, steam driven vehicles, fire wagons, and gasoline driven vehicles. There certainly was a lot of history there. It was getting hot (high of 95 that day with winds of 35 mph), but because there were so many trees in the grounds, we had plenty of shade. The mansion is surrounded by 270 varieties of trees and shrubs.

Sitting in front of the mansion in the shade, we found our good friends Orrin and Mayola Holen from McClusky, North Dakota so it was fun to visit with them and catch up on what is happening in their lives. We first met them in Mesa, AZ at our Model T club meeting we belong to. Like us, they are snowbirds from North Dakota and go to Arizona to escape the sometimes harsh winters of North Dakota. It was also at that club meeting a couple years ago that we met Lorie and Mel Poppe. So it was fun to get to know all of them better on this tour. Photos were taken of us standing in front of our "T" with the mansion in the background and the photo almost looks like we are in front of the White House in Washington D.C. (that photo might become the photo on our Christmas card.)





We then went to a local park and had a catered lunch. There we met others on the tour and talked about "T"s and what kind of carburetor do you have? Reg has always had trouble with his '27 T because it had a vaporizer carburetor. He met someone else (Gail Lanning) whose car also has a vaporizer carburetor so they talked on and on about how to get it from leaking air. Gail was even so kind to give Reg a diagram of the carburetor. We decided not to spend too much time sightseeing and head back to the hotel before the afternoon rush hour started (we had enough of the morning traffic).

In the evening we went to the hotel restaurant and enjoyed a tasty meal and in the parking lot the host club had ice cream for everyone. That was a treat. We then met Mike Vaughn, the tour coordinator; and we thanked him for all his hard work. He was a gracious host and explained that he was not the only one who worked hard; all the club members were involved and helped. Mel and Lorie are members of this club because they also live in NE.



Wednesday June 20<sup>th</sup> off we went again but didn't have quite as far to tour that day as the attractions were—local. We had 2 choices to tour in the morning, the Larsen Tractor Test Museum or the International Quilt Center and Museum. Since I am not a quilter, I decided to go with Reg to the tractor test museum. This was the highlight of the tour for Reg. There he saw many antique tractors, some of which he use to drive when he was helping out on the farm. There sitting on the end of a tractor was our friend Orrin. We teased him how come he always was there first sitting and waiting for everyone to show up. We then realized he has a Model A engine in his Model T and can drive faster. Sure enough as the days went by, we'd say "I wonder where Orrin will be sitting this time" and there he'd be the first one to be at the site waiting for us.

The Nebraska Tractor Test Laboratory was very interesting, and the history was explained to us that in 1919 a law was passed in Nebraska that tractors more than 40 hp must be tested and approved by the Tractor Test Board if they are going to be sold in Nebraska. Once approved, a sales permit is issued by the Nebraska Department of Agriculture. Every tractor tested must be a production model equipped with the most common features that will be sold in Nebraska. Tractors are tested in 5 performance areas: PTO power (unless tractor has no PTO), hydraulic flow and power, sound level, drawbar power and three point lift capacity. Completing all 5 tests takes about one week per tractor so this is a very busy place.

Next we drove to the Museum of American Speed (Speedway Motors) where all the Ts were assembled for a group photo. "Speedy" Bill Smith is the founder of the museum and he was there to view all the Ts. He enjoyed seeing all the T's and was such a gracious host. Lunch was served inside the museum, and Speedy Bill talked about his love for speed and that it became a "passion" with him. Bill has 8 decades of experience with racing and hot rods starting in the 1940's when he raced roaring roadsters on half-mile county fair tracks. The museum has 150,000 square feet of display space housing thousands of examples of vintage engines, performance parts and accessories, race cars and historic automobiles of the past 100 years. The museum also has thousands of aftermarket accessories and speed equipment for the Model T Ford. Everything from water pumps to wheels are on display including the 5 Millionth Model T to roll off the Ford assembly line. Also there is the world's largest collection of pedal cars, over 1,000 pedal cars. I enjoyed the collection of lunch boxes, many of them I remembered seeing when I was growing up.

That evening we met at the Anderson Ford car dealership where we were to display our cars and have a "running board" BBQ supper; but Mother Nature had other plans, and it rained hard with lightning so our outside picnic went inside the dealership. We felt so bad because the public missed seeing the cars on display although there were some hardy souls with umbrellas out in the parking lot admiring the Ts.

Thursday was another fun day starting early (7:30 a.m.) where we drove to York, NE and visited the Wessel's Living History Farm. This is a very unique restored farm that is operated as it was in the 1920's. It was a lovely farm with a wonderful 2 story farm house and big front porch and there sitting on the porch in a rocking chair was our good friend Orrin waiting for us, so Reg sat with him and they visited. The weather was beautiful and the Ts were all lined up in a row which drew a lot of attention from the other visitors to the farm, some were from a nursing home so you knew they enjoyed seeing the T's. Lunch was a traditional "chicken dinner" at the farm

which once again was delicious. This tour was turning out to be a "5 lb. tour" (weight gained from eating so much).

Friday June 22<sup>nd</sup> we went to the Strategic Air and Space Museum where there was a wonderful display of aircraft from all decades of fight. A member on our tour Russ Grunewald use to be a B52 pilot so the tour guide turned the tour over to him, and Russ gave us firsthand information about the B52. We could have spent the whole day at this museum but had to keep up with the tour. Next was lunch at the "Round the Bend Steakhouse" and off we went back to Lincoln. On our way, we saw Lorie and Mel by the side of the road. We stopped to see if we could help, I should say Reg helped, I just stood around and talked with Lorie. But it was gratifying to see that so many T's did stop to see if they could help.

We all are in the same boat, if someone has car trouble, we all want to stop and help. I don't think there were many breakdowns; one couple from Texas were disappointed as the wife said, "We drove 1000 miles just to put the T on the trouble wagon and drive our modern pickup on the tour". I guess that's the chance you take going on a tour. We returned to the hotel in plenty of time to rest and then get ready for the closing banquet. Many people came to the banquet dressed in period clothing; and we had a live Jazz Band performing for us. After the delicious meal, we had the Speedster Race Car Hall of Fame awards and induction ceremony. The award for Restoration of the year was a 1923 Mercury bodied speedster restored and owned by Bud Voth. Bud was there to accept his award and was so proud to go outside and show us the vehicle.

Closing remarks were made by the tour chairman and it was announced that arrangements have not been made for the next year's tour. We need a club to step up and take on the tour planning. (I told Reg, sit on your hands, and don't volunteer because we know how much work is involved.) We want to thank the Nebraskaland Model T and Antique Car club especially Mike Vaughn, chairperson. Also thanks to Mel and Lorie for all they did for the tour.

# MTFCA NATIONAL TOUR – HEARTLAND OF AMERICA "T" TOUR JUNE 17-22, 2012 — LINCOLN, NEBRASKA HOST CHAPTER: NEBRASKALAND MODEL T AND ANTIQUE CAR CLUB

The MTFCA National Tour was hosted by the Nebraskaland Model T and Antique Car Club based in Lincoln NE and chaired by Mike Vaughn from the Nebraska Club. It all started on Sunday, registering the T's and parking the trailers for 50 entrants. They came from Minnesota, New Mexico, Wyoming, California, South Dakota, North Dakota, Texas, Indiana, Washington, New York, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Kansas, Florida, Arizona, Colorado, Ohio, Nevada, Oklahoma, Canada and The United Kingdom. The early arrivals had the opportunity to tour the worlds fifth-oldest Ford dealership in continuance family ownership in Ceresco NE approximately 10 miles north of Lincoln. The Ford dealership remains in the same location although the building has been updated and renovated.

On Monday the 18th, we left early for a 183 mile trip to Beatrice and Rock Creek Station. In Beatrice, we toured the Gage County Historical Museum and the Homestead National Monument. This was the home of Daniel

Freeman, one of the first homesteaders taking advantage of the Homestead Act which was signed by President Lincoln in 1862 and went into effect on Jan 1st, 1863. Thirty of the 50 states had homestead lands during the Homesteads Act existence(1863-1986). We traveled on to Rock Creek Station which was established in 1857 and catered to stages, freight and emigrant traffic and the Pony Express on the Oregon Trail. It was here where James Butler Hickok alias Wild Bill Hickok killed David McCanles and began his career as a gunfighter.



On Tuesday, we traveled 128 miles to Nebraska City which was home of J Sterling Morton who as president of the State Board of Agriculture, introduced a resolution calling for a tree-planting day to be known as Arbor Day. In 1885, the Legislature made Arbor Day a legal holiday in Nebraska. It was so popular that over one million trees



were planted throughout the state on that a first Arbor Day. Since that time, the observance has spread to nearly every state and to many foreign countries. He was the father of Joy Morton, founder of the Morton Salt Company. On Wednesday, we traveled across town to the Nebraska Tractor Test Laboratory on the university campus. In 1919, a farmer from Osceola NE, elected to the Nebraska State Legislature, frustrated with poor performing tractors, introduced the Nebraska Tractor Bill which became law. In order for a tractor to be sold in the state of Nebraska, it must be tested and exceed the claims made by the manufacturer and have a state issued sales



permit. The University of Nebraska– Lincoln Tractor Test Lab is the only test lab in North America. At the same time, tour participants were touring The International Quilt Study Center also located on the U of N campus. With more than 2300 quilts, it is believed to be the worlds largest publicly held quilt collection. Nearly 20 countries are represented in the collection.



Later we traveled to Speedway Motors where some of us received a personal tour by "Speedy Bill" himself. The Smith Collection museum is the home of the 5 millionth Model T built. It features the worlds largest collection of antique racing engines, numerous restored antique vehicles, and is also the home of Kirk Wright's skinning' wagon and race car. Kirk was a member of the Sun Country Model T Club in Phoenix.

On Thursday, we traveled approximately 152 miles (round trip) to York to visit the Wessels Living History Farm. The farm is a 1/4 section of land with a 1920's house restored along with a post and beam barn. It consisted of a granary, chicken house and other outbuildings. It also contains a machine shed which houses restored tractors and equipment from the Wessels collection.





On Friday, we traveled to the Strategic Air & Space Museum approximately 78 miles round trip. This 300,000 square foot World-class museum houses a huge collection of famous aircraft, missiles, and spacecraft, including the B-1, SR-71, B-52, B-36, MiG-21, FB-111, Vucan and Apollo 009 as well as the history of the Strategic Air Command.



After stopping for lunch at the Round The Bend Steakhouse, we proceeded to return to Lincoln. As I was coming into Elmwood, my car backfired and was dead. My only thought was to call the trouble truck. As it turned out, both trouble trucks were already full and headed back to Lincoln. I jumped out of the car and opened the hood to find my timer hanging by the wires. From my observation, it was too much oil—in the oilcan. The roller in the timer had worn out from lack of oil. Reg and Roselyn Urness were following us and he just happened to have a spare roller. Within minutes we were back on the road and back to Lincoln. Thanks Reg for coming to my rescue.

All in all it was a good tour. We traveled approximately 560 miles for the week.
