

The History of the 1924 Wicker-Covered Model

1924 Ford Model T Wicker-Covered Roadster "Basket Case"

Jake and Jannelle Kluch of Mazon, Illinois, are the proud owners of this unique car. The 1924 Model T Ford Roadster was covered in wicker when the car was new, in the hometown of a wicker baby-buggy company, Menominee, Michigan. Rumors had it that six cars were covered in wicker, but further research has revealed that this is the only one.

The **"Basket Case"**, as this roadster is known, has been the family since at least 1934. The 1935 registration on this display is in the name of John Pinkowski, the current owners' great uncle. John (who reportedly purchased the roadster for \$8 during the depression) is shown in one of the black and white photos with his wife, suitcases mounted on the running boards (and dog beneath the car!). John's only heir, Raymond, diad in 1001 hearing the care to his concision for the suitcase of the

died in 1991, leaving the car to his cousin, Genevieve (Jenny) Kluch and her husband, Jacob J. Kluch. The Kluch's moved the Basket Case to their home Decatur, Michigan. He painstakingly restored the car, cleaning and repainting the wicker, adding new tires and some mechanical parts. The wicker is original.

Jake, Sr., took great pride in showing the Basket Case at as many car shows as he could reach. His proudest moments started with being invited to the Henry Ford Museum's Old Car Festival in 1993, which they attended every year. The Basket Case was the featured car at Sloan Museum's Summer Auto Fair in 1994, and was awarded many trophies and compliments at car shows in Michigan and Illinois. After Mr. Kluch died in 1997, his son, Jacob H. Kluch, became the owner and continues to show the car.

The Basket Case was selected by the **Ford 100th Anniversary Committee** to represent **1924** as one of the "100 Icons that Move the World" in June 2003. The Basket Case has also been featured in Model T Times, Hemmings Motor News, Old Car Weekly, "I Love My Car" on WLS-TV channel 7 in Chicago, and the Morris Daily Herald.

State of the art automotive technology in 1924: the four-cylinder, 20 horsepower engine has no oil pan, oil filter, oil pump, fuel filter or pump, water pump, or air filter; the brakes are actually bands on the transmission that stopped the transmission (sometimes!), and shock absorbers were not available, even as an option! One unique accessory is the *"Fat Man"* steering wheel, an early version of tilt steering.

Located on the Valley's east side, this park takes in 3,648 acres set at the western end of the Goldfield Mountains, adjacent to the Tonto National Forest. The park contains a large variety of plants and animals that call the lower Sonoran Desert home. Along the most popular feature of the park, the Wind Cave Trail, water seeps from the roof of the alcove to support hanging gardens of Rock Daisy. The Wind Cave is formed at the boundary between the volcanic tuff and granite on Pass Mountain. Breathtaking views from this 2,840-foot elevation are offered to all visitors.

Usery Mountain Regional Park became a park in 1967. Pass Mountain, also known as "Scarface" to the local folks, is the geological focal point of the park. The mountain itself was named for King Usery (sometimes spelled Ussery). "King" was his first name, rather than a title. He was a cattleman who was running stock in the area in the late 1870's and early 1880's.

If yes, space is limited - while free, registration and pre-approval is required to exhibit a vehicle (see attached registration form).





Flip a toaster on its side to make grilled cheese.




Use a rubber band to rescue a stripped screw.
