


























February 20 - APACHE JUNCTION; ELKS CLUB CAR SHOW By: Sandy Hart

February 27 - APACHE JUNCTION; Howard Down's T Clinic at Austin Graton's *By: Austin Graton*

We held a work session on Thursday, February 27th to fix some noted deficiencies on Howard Downs '27 T Roadster. A small team consisting of Austin, Bill Allen, Jerry Griffin, Tom Auterman, Bob Stone and Jack Forsell assembled at the Graton's to prep Howard's T for selling.

I had prepared a list of about 12 items that we knew needed to be repaired. However, as we further evaluated the car and began correcting the known deficiencies, we began to find more items that needed attention. At this point the list got longer. While moving the car by pulling on the front wheel spokes we noted considerable vertical movement where the front yoke attaches to the pan. Upon inspection, we found that the ball of the yoke was worn to about half the size it was originally. We removed it and replaced it with a good used one I had on the shelf. The front spring shackles and bushings were badly worn so we replaced them with a new set I had on hand. The perches are also worn, but we didn't have any better ones available. They should be replaced by the new owner.

The radiator overflow tube was broken off just above the core and when we attempted to put an extension on it, the remainder crumbled away. Upon further inspection of the radiator we found seepage from the core and noted previous repairs and determined it was not serviceable. I had another on the shelf that may be serviceable which we will try when we get it running. Howard had purchased a new radiator mounting kit. When we started to install it we found the wood that supports the radiator under the hood shelf was rotted, so that needs to be replaced before we install the new radiator mounting kit.

Howard had purchased a carb repair kit, but upon inspection we found the core was probably not serviceable. I found another good used carb, so we put the kit in that one. We will know soon if that works. Oil was leaking from the pan oil plug. We found someone had put an O ring under the plug and it would not seal. Jack had a new plug gasket, so he put that on and it no longer leaks.

Joe had previously noticed that oil was leaking from the starter. Howard had bought a seal kit for it, so Jack tackled the job of installing the seal kit. After a couple of trips with Bill to his shop to press the bushing and seal in it was ready for reassembly except for the rear bearing/bushing that needs to be replaced.

Probably the most difficult thing still remaining to be fixed is the top. The fabric lacks a couple of inches from reaching the back of the seat frame where it needs to be attached, the whole top does not seem to be configured properly. The clamps that attach to the windshield stations are at a strange angle and the rear bow seems like it is too far forward. We noted the intermediate irons had been modified. Bill has some used top canvas that is in good condition we may try to fit on. Probably the simplest option will be to add some fabric to the bottom of the back section so it will attach to the frame.

Another thing we noted late was that there is very little holding the bottom seat up. There appears to be a frame piece missing that would attach to the body mounting brackets. It appears that the seat support would be mounted on top of that .

There are several things we still need to do to get the car ready to sell. We will probably set up another work session to get it finished in the near future. Thanks to all those who helped on this project.

Unpainted model T wheels were mounted horizontally on a vertical spindle above a circular vat partially filled with paint. The vat was raised, immersing the wheel in the paint and then partway lowered. The wheel was then spun at 540 to 720 rpm for about a minute while still within the vat but above the surface level of the paint.

After spinning, the paint was considered to be dry enough that the wheel could be handled and it was placed in a drying room for the next 24 hours. The subsequent two coats of paint were applied in a similar manner. The second coat was F-159 Black Wheel Color Varnish. This was followed by F-404 Finish Coat on Wheels. F-404 could be described as a nearly clear topcoat varnish. It contained only enough pigment to give it a dark tint. This painting process resulted in wheels that were a deep, gloss black color.

MARCH 8-11

Springtime Tour to Sierra Vista

The Hidden Valley Model T Club is holding a four day tour to the Sierra Vista region of Arizona March 8-11. The schedule is: Saturday March 8, will be a simple run from Sierra Vista to Bisbee, the route out will be through Hereford, which is quite flat and a more direct route back which includes a long hill out of Bisbee, mileage is about 60 miles.

Sunday, March 9, will be run north from Sierra Vista north to visit the Kartchner Caverns, then on to Benson, then south to Tombstone and then direct back to Sierra Vista with a distance of 80 miles. Again there are no serious hills.

Monday, March 10, will be out from Sierra Vista to Patagonia for lunch through Sonoita, visit an auto restoration shop and a museum, a little dirt road and a ford then back thru the Army base over some really narrow, quiet but paved roads, with a distance of 90 miles with no serious hills.

Tuesday, March 11, will be a run from Sierra Vista out to Douglas, with lunch at the historic Gadstone hotel and back to Sierra Vista for a run of 110 miles.

The tour is open to all Model T's (and Model A's if you must). 

RECIPE OF THE MONTH FISH CHOWDER

1/4 lb butter

3 cups chopped onion

3 Tablespoons flour

4 cups chopped potatoes (raw)

4 cups hot water

4 cups cold milk

Salt (generous amount, 1 Tablespoon or more) Pepper to taste

1 1/2 lb white fish or oysters

1. Saute onion in butter till tender.

2. Add flour, stir and cool for a minute or two.

3. Add potatoes and hot water.

4. Bring to a boil.

5. Reduce heat - simmer 40 minutes.

6. Bake fish with a bit of milk and salt & pepper for approx. 15 min @ 350 degrees (do not over cook).

7, Flake fish, cover and keep warm on top of stove.

8. Remove potato mixture from heat.

9. Add fish and liquid, milk, salt & pepper. Mash a few times with masher to thicken.

10. Return to low heat and simmer for just a few minutes.

11. Best made day before and reheated (do not boil). Add additional salt and pepper as necessary.
