



The second crossover is at a traffic light which might be easier.

The parade will form on Main Street just west of Idaho Road. We will enter at the parking lot of the strip mall at the Northwest corner of Idaho and Main. Those entering the parade will need to have a copy of the vehicle insurance card to give to the parade officials or one they can take a picture of. The parade begins at 7:00 pm and goes from Phelps Drive North and (Apache Trail) West to Thunderbird and back. At the end of the parade you will be allowed to turn into the Fry's gas station entrance or proceed East on Old West Highway.

Lite 'em up & drive 'em out, and we'll see you there!! Bring a jacket for the cool evening, and of course your camera.

CHRISTMAS IS COMING! "The Night Henry Ford Met Santa"



A MAN, A WOMAN & THEIR Ts

My desire for a Model T started when I was quite young spending the summer months on my grandfather's farm in Bentonville, Arkansas. A retired mid-level executive with the Ford Motor

Company, he thought the Model T was the best car ever made and at an early age I decided my first car was going to be a T. However, when I turned sixteen, I bought a clean 1929 Model A Tudor from a friend for \$75. I drove it a couple of years and upgraded to more modern vehicles through college and my USAF career. My love for old cars never waned as I always had an old "toy" including 1929 Reo Flying Cloud Sport Coupe, 1929 Cadillac Sedan, 1967 Austin Healy 3000, 1957 Porsche Speedster, 1967 Austin Cooper S, 1937 MGTA plus a Corvette and many classic Mustangs to name a few, but never a Model T Ford.

Upon retiring after 23 years in the USAF, we made a move to the Lake of the Ozarks in Central





Missouri. The move from Illinois to Missouri was quite a parade transporting two classic Mustangs and a 1952 Jaguar XK120 Roadster. Over time we sold the Mustangs and finally the Jag. My wife, Susan, wanted to select the next "toy" when she spotted a 1923 Model T Touring for sale in Branson, MO. Although I liked the car, I convinced her it was too slow (I figured the top speed of a Model T at about 25mph!) and if we got an older car it should be a Model A. She agreed and picked out a beautiful 1931 Model A Deluxe Roadster that we drove for several years all over the USA. Our trips included South Carolina, Michigan, Gulf Coast, New England and the top of

Pike's Peak but I'm getting ahead of myself. We had joined the local Model A Club and found that most of the Model A owners also had Model T's. One fateful day, while driving the roadster I met up with a friend driving his 1920 Model T Touring. Susan asked for a ride and he opened my eyes to the joys of driving a well maintained Model T. We bought a 1925 Touring, joined the MTFCA and the Heart of the Ozarks Model T Club in Springfield, MO. Life hasn't been boring since. The next year, we were talked into organizing the 2001 Hillbilly Tour at the Lake of the Ozarks and we kept that job until after the 2011 Hillbilly Tour in Jefferson City, MO. Since we enjoyed driving the Model T more than the Model A, we sold it and bought a beautifully restored 1914 Touring.



This is truly Susan's car, she found it, negotiated the sale, paid for it and even drives it! I have always liked the early "Doctor's" Coupe with suicide doors. Several years ago I bought one to restore but the

wood repair was beyond my capabilities so I sold it to a real woodworker in our club and he did a beautiful job restoring it. This year I bought another early 1923 Coupe and I believe it will work out well. Now we own three Model T Fords not counting the 1919 Centerdoor chassis I have stuck out by the driveway as "Yard Art".

Henry Ford intended for the Model T to be available to everyman and for those men to drive their cars. That's what we do. I avoid car shows, did that with the Mustangs and have a room full of trophies I don't know what to do with. We try to make four or five Model T tours a year. Our favorite tour, excluding the Hillbilly Tour of course, is the Covered Bridge Tour in Rockville, IN. This year was our



8th time to attend this tour. We are asked many times, why? It's the same roads, they can't move the bridges. Driving the Model T is great and we have beautiful Model T roads in the Ozarks, but we don't have all the people! We have made so many good friends over the years driving our Model T. These tours are a big part of our social life.

Which brings us to how did we get to Apache Junction and the EVMTFC. The Model T Ford, of course! We met a great couple from Dover, New Hampshire while on the 2002 MTFCA National Hillbilly Tour in Springfield, MO. You may know them, Bill & Kae Allen. Another wonderful couple from Wolf Point, Montana, John & Lorna Jackson met us in 2007 at the MTFCA National Hillbilly Tour in Springfield, MO. The next year, the Jackson's brought a super couple from Kelso, Washington, Larry & Sandy Hart, to the 2008 Hillbilly Tour in Cape Girardeau, MO. But there are two more good friends in this tale, Rick & Char Bonebright from Florence, Montana, whom we met on the 2006 Hillbilly Tour in Excelsior Springs, MO. The Bonebrights knew the Harts and Jacksons through their association with the Model T and visited them in Apache Junction for a couple of weeks. For months all Rick could talk about was the great time he & Char had riding with Joe Fellin and how friendly everyone in the EVMTFC was. He convinced us we were in the wrong place for the winter and shouldn't go back to Harlingen, TX but try Apache Junction. We did and have never turned back. Again, driving the Model T Ford is fun, but it's the people that make the difference!

There is also a story behind that vehicle. This chassis is what is left of a 1919 Centerdoor. Shortly after it was purchased, the owner passed away and the car remained in the barn for several years until some of the grandkids decided it would make a nice toy to drive around in the fields. They cut away all of the body down to the firewall and left the front seats. Shortly they lost interest and it went back to the barn for many decades. In the early 1950's a friend of mine and his dad were starting what has become a large antique car collection here in Camdenton, MO. They bought this very low mileage chassis and stuck it out in the woods behind their museum to use as parts.

In about 2006, it was offered to me if I wanted to drag it out of the woods. We had to cut down several trees to rescue it. My friend told me he doubted if the chassis had over 100 miles on it. I discovered they had filled the cylinders with used motor oil and covered the hood with a large piece of sheet metal to protect it. I removed the head and transmission cover plate to find a rust free standard engine and tranny that looked as if it just came from the factory. This summer, I removed the rear end to discover the same condition with a new u-joint, axles, hubs and a 10 tooth pinion! Of course the wood spoke wheels were rotted away.

The rear end is now running around in Apache Junction in my 1925 Touring and the engine and front end will sit there in its protected condition until I need it. In the mean time the "Yard Art" receives many comments from passerbys, most are positive.

The Tablecloth

The brand new pastor and his wife, newly assigned to their first ministry, to reopen a church in suburban Brooklyn, arrived in early October excited about their opportunities. When they saw their church, it was very run down and needed much work. They set a goal to have everything done in time to have their first service on Christmas Eve.

They worked hard, repairing pews, plastering walls, painting, etc, and on December 18 were ahead of schedule and just about finished.

On December 19 a terrible tempest - a driving rainstorm - hit the area and lasted for two days.

On the 21st, the pastor went over to the church. His heart sank when he saw that the roof had leaked, causing a large area of plaster about 20 feet by 8 feet to fall off the front wall of the sanctuary just behind the pulpit, beginning about head high.

The pastor cleaned up the mess on the floor, and not knowing what else to do but postpone the Christmas Eve service, headed home. On the way he noticed that a local business was having a flea market type sale for charity, so he stopped in. One of the items was a beautiful, handmade, ivory colored, crocheted tablecloth with exquisite work, fine colors and a Cross embroidered right in the center. It was just the right size to cover the hole in the front wall. He bought it and headed back to the church.

By this time it had started to snow. An older woman running from the opposite direction was trying to catch the bus. She missed it. The pastor invited her to wait in the warm church for the next bus 45 minutes later.

She sat in a pew and paid no attention to the pastor while he got a ladder, hangers, etc., to put up the tablecloth as a wall tapestry. The pastor could hardly believe how beautiful it looked and it covered up the entire problem area.

Then he noticed the woman walking down the center aisle. Her face was like a sheet. "Pastor," she asked, "where did you get that tablecloth?" The pastor explained. The woman asked him to check the lower right corner to see if the initials 'EBG' were crocheted into it there. They were. These were the initials of the woman, and she had made this tablecloth 35 years before, in Austria.

The woman could hardly believe it as the pastor told how he had just gotten "The Tablecloth". The woman explained that before the war she and her husband were well-to-do people in Austria.

When the Nazis came, she was forced to leave. Her husband was going to follow her the next week. He was captured, sent to prison and she never saw her husband or her home again.

The pastor wanted to give her the tablecloth; but she made the pastor keep it for the church. The pastor insisted on driving her home. That was the least he could do. She lived on the other side of Staten Island and was only in Brooklyn for the day for a housecleaning job.

What a wonderful service they had on Christmas Eve. The church was almost full. The music and the spirit were great. At the end of the service, the pastor and his wife greeted everyone at the door and many said that they would return.

One older man, whom the pastor recognized from the neighborhood, continued to sit in one of the pews and stare, and the pastor wondered why he wasn't leaving.

The man asked him where he got the tablecloth on the front wall because it was identical to one that his wife had made years ago when they lived in Austria before the war and how could there be two tablecloths so much alike?

He told the pastor how the Nazis came, how he forced his wife to flee for her safety and he was supposed to follow her, but he was arrested and put in a prison. He never saw his wife or his home again in all the 35 years between.

The pastor asked him if he would allow him to take him for a little ride. They drove to Staten Island and to the same house where the pastor had taken the woman three days earlier.

He helped the man climb the three flights of stairs to the woman's apartment, knocked on the door and he saw the greatest Christmas reunion he could ever imagine.

True story - submitted by Pastor Rob Reid who says God does work in mysterious ways. I asked the Lord to bless you as I prayed for you today, to guide you and protect you as you go along your way. His love is always with you. His promises are true, and when we give Him all our cares we know He will see us through.
